


Report yellow-legged Asian hornets and save our bees!

The UK is on high alert for yellow-legged Asian hornets - they kill pollinators!



How to spot a nest



MARCH/APRIL

Queen hornets leave hibernation and build tennis ball-sized embryo nests in sheltered spots like barns, sheds, garages and under eaves. The queen, seen above behind the first few cells of her nest, has lots more work to do.



MAY/JUNE


Nests are enlarged to football-sized primary nests to accommodate the growing hornet population.



JULY to OCTOBER

Workers build a large (~20-60cm), secondary nest often high up in a tree canopy, or in brambles, hedges or buildings. Look for homets feeding on flowers, fallen fruit and hunting insects.

Don't confuse Asian hornets with other insects
